

UPDATE ON NITRUS OXIDE CANISTERS

There is good news and bad news!

I contacted the Police Liaison Officer at Elmbridge Borough Council who was pretty appalled by the photos I sent him. He assured me he would see what he could do and I am delighted to report that I have not found any canisters or the balloons that go with them in the West End area - mostly in the children's' playground opposite the Hospice. I had a collection of 35 collected from January to June this year! However, since then, I have found several on the Portsmouth Road and some more on the road from Esher to the bypass.

I have not found any of the tiny steel capsules that used to be strewn on the pavements, but these are one dose only, whereas the heavy cylinders contain a high amount of doses which tells me that the users have graduated to these, which is very concerning. If you happen to find a canister (weighing approximately 3.5 pounds), it cannot be put in either your recycling or landfill bin as it can still contain the nitrous oxide gases - I have frequently found full containers that have been hidden in undergrowth for future use! Leave any container in a carrier bag beside your bins and mark the bag clearly with a label saying "Hazardous Waste".

Hopefully, the bin men will take it to a safe place for disposal.

GARSONS WILD WEST END TOWN PUMPKIN TRAIL



COBHAM WATER MILL BIG CLEAN-UP: A GRAND SUCCESS

This extended to the grounds where we dug out particularly stubborn shrub roots which proved a real challenge and hardwood found in the loft made 2 new bench seats.

Volunteers enjoyed refreshments to keep their spirits high throughout the day and the collective efforts not only enhanced the mill's appearance but fostered a sense of community spirit and pride.

"This event showcased the incredible dedication of our volunteers." said William, Chairman of the Cobham Mill Preservation Trust "Their hard work and enthusiasm has made a significant impact on the mill which helps preserve this historic site for future generations to enjoy."

As the mill now prepares to hibernate for winter, the Trust looks forward to welcoming visitors again in the spring, starting the second Sunday in April 2025.

THE BLITZ

I must have been lucky!

When the war started my father dug a great hole in the garden and there he built an Anderson shelter. There were no windows but one night I was late in getting into the shelter, at the end of the garden, and as I stood there the searchlights caught a large object floating above our neighbour's house. It fascinated me. I stood looking as it came down from high up "Hurry up down here" shouted my father. It turned out to be a parachute land mine.

A classmate of mine called Speechly had written a piece which the BBC actually used.

"In September 1940 the family started using the pubic air raid shelter. On the night of 26th September 1940 there was an almighty explosion. A parachute mine, (containing a ton of explosive), had hit the top of a tree, near the shelter. The force of the blast blew off the escape hatch at the end of the shelter. If the trajectory of the mine had been different, it would have killed us all.


After this happened, we had to stay there in the dark and the dust until the ARP man said "come out" He said the mine exploded up in the tree. 'Had it exploded on the ground, we would have had it".

The mine caused extensive damage to our house which was only 150 yards away. The heavy plaster ceiling in the house next door and window frames were blown in. The slates from the roof were blown off.

After this my dad built an underground shelter. On the 29th November 1940 our house took a direct hit from an incendiary bomb and father's bedroom was burnt out. Christmas 1940 father bought a Morrison Shelter. It doubled up as a dining table.

Bombing raids became rarer until V1 flying bombs "doodlebugs" started in June 1944. Occasionally I saw one pass over our garden. We listened for the bang!"

On the 7th December 1944 at 8.08pm there was a great explosion! A V2 rocket had crashed into Hayes End Recreation Ground 200 yards from my home. It devastated some bungalows. Fortunately there were several houses between us and the explosion. It left a big hole in the park. The local lads always used it later tor a cycle track. Several incendiaries fell on next door neighbour's doorsteps and father used a stirrup pump to put them out. We had little damage except when one night father put his head out of my bedroom window and suddenly got a shock for all round his neck were pieces of broken glass: evidence of a nearby explosion!

The church was beautifully decorated for our Harvest service on 6th October and we had a wonderful selection of donations from our congregation. This year, all our gifts (from both Christ Church and St George's) have gone to the Lower Green Community Centre (LGCC), where they have an Emergency Food Store. This runs in addition to the foodbank, which is only available on certain days and from not very nearby locations. This provides immediate emergency items to support local families in the interim. The team at LGCC were so grateful for the amazing amount of goods they received, which will certainly keep them going over the Christmas and New Year period.



Our annual Pet Service (our 16th!) took place in mid-September and there was a lovely turnout of lively dogs this year - some of whom attempted to join in with the hymns! It is always such a joyful service that is remarkably relaxed, considering the potential for chaos which never seems to happen. Every year a local animal charity is invited to give us a rundown of how they operate.

This year were delighted to have Sue Bohane join us, who is currently a puppy minder for the Guide Dogs charity, along with her lovely Labrador pup Enzo. Guide Dogs are always in need of people to look after the puppies for about 9/10 months before they move to 'big school' at a year old. Sue and Enzo are reaching the end of this period and she was able to give the congregation a good insight to what this entails. As well as the day to day experiences that we all have, these puppies have to be taken on buses, trains, escalators, into pubs, shops, hospitals, airports, aeroplanes etc. At the end of the service there was a collection for the charity and £131 was raised.

By the time you read this, our Rector Darren will have returned full-time from his adoption leave.

At our service on the 3rd November, we took the opportunity to thank /Jonathan (Revd Jonathan Andrew) for holding the fort during Darren's absence. Not only has he presided at Sunday services but has conducted baptisms, weddings and funerals ... and still finding time to run the book club!

All this, while he is supposedly "retired". By way of our appreciation, St George's presented him with a mini Olive Tree, a bottle of wine and Garden Centre vouchers. Hopefully he will have time to make use of the vouchers in his retirement!

ESHER FRENCH CIRCLE

Cycling the Canal du Midi Talk (in French) Esher French Circle 7pm, Wednesday 11 December Village Hall, West End, Esher

Peter Prowse's talk about his bike ride from Toulouse to Sète will include stories and music relating to this masterpiece of 17th century French engineering.

It took Peter Prowse and his friend – another Peter – a week to cover the 260km from the start of the Canal du Midi to its finish at the Mediterranean port of Sète. As well as talking (in French) about the people who built the canal – 350 years ago – Peter will bring his guitar along and sing a few songs linked to towns and people he encountered along his journey.

Peter's talk, on Wednesday 11 December at 7.30pm in West End's village hall, rounds off 2024 for Esher French Circle. The season so far has included two very different talks: On 16 October, French history enthusiast Odile Hughson told the story of the exile of the Orleans family periods in various royal palaces in and around Richmond – including Claremont, where Louis Philippe spent his later years until his death in August 1850.

On Wednesday 20 November, Christian Michel – who describes himself as a 'thinker and entrepreneur' gave a thought-provoking talk entitled 'From Plato to Putin – the dangerous theory of a multi-polar world.'

Elmbridge Borough Council mulls over the future of its Civic Centre.

We all know how much the legacy of Covid has changed the way people work. With the advent of working from home, businesses have been reviewing the space they need to run effectively and Elmbridge Borough Council is no different. The site that the current Civic Centre occupies is approximately 6 acres and the offices are now underutilised, as is the staff car park. It's felt that the Council cannot continue with the current arrangements and a number of options have been explored over the past couple of years.

At September's Cabinet meeting, it was agreed to move to the next stage of identifying the preferred options for the retention or development of the Civic Centre and its site and Consultants have been briefed to present the business cases for three different options:

- 1. Refurbish and modify the existing building
- 2. Demolish and rebuild a new, smaller, Civic Centre on the same site.
- 3. Relocate to a different building in Esher and redevelop the existing site for housing, retail and some civic amenities.

How might this benefit Esher Residents?

Any proposal should reduce the long-term costs of housing the Council through the more efficient use of space. Relocating the Civic Centre would provide an opportunity to build a mixed-use development of much-needed town centre housing of the kind of homes that people want and need, including affordable units. Alongside this would be retail and social space promoting a proper civic presence in Esher.

The Civic Centre's carbon performance is far below that of modern buildings and all new proposals will seek to improve this considerably, as well as improving on site biodiversity.


